

DEVARATTAM — a tribal dance form

Devarattam is a ritualistic tribal dance form performed by the male members of the community of Kambala Navakars of Tamil Nadu. There are no lyrics. Movements are abstracted from the actions of hunting which was the traditional vocation of this community. They believe that Devarattam was danced by the celestial beings - hence the name Devarattam!

The percussion instrument used is called the "Devadundubhi", which is played by the Majavar Nayakars. They control the rhythm of dance as well as the movements. As the tempo picks up, this vibrant, vigorous dance is fascinating to watch.

V. R. DEVIKA, Director, Cultural Outreach, Madras Craft Foundation and Cultural co-ordinator of INTACH will present and compere this programme.

VISIT TO MAHABALIPURAM COLLEGE OF ARCHITECTURE AND SCULPTURE



Indian iconography and temple architecture are based on canons developed through centuries of experimentation. The stance of a deity, even measurements and ornamentation, all follow rules laid down in the ancient Shastras. The method of making icons has not changed over millennia — granite is still carved with hammer and chisel; wood still shaped with hand tools.

To understand this ancient art, we will be visiting the Mahabalipuram College of Architecture and Sculpture, the only one of its kind in India. Explanations will be given by a Sthapathi, a traditional sculptor, followed by visits to workers sculpting on wood, stone and plaster (many for export to temples in the U.S.A. and U.K.).

The visit will be followed by lunch at ITDC's Temple Bay Resort at the Beachcomber Seashore Restaurant. There will be a charge of Rs. 70/- per head (for lunch and tips).




Come and view the film and join us for a follow up discussion on aging and identity, courage and power, and how a woman achieves control over her own life.

THE STORY OF THE SYMPHONY: ANDRE PREVIN ON HAYDN AND MOZART

The symphonies of Haydn and Mozart represent a landmark in the history of Western music. Living at a time when, the composer was fast making the transition from being a servant in a grand household to being an individual with a personal and committed voice, Haydn and Mozart laid firm foundations for a rich form of musical expression in that strange phenomenon called the 'Symphony'. They wrote over one hundred and fifty symphonies between them and their influence has had a lasting effect on later symphonic forms and styles and on the development of the symphony orchestra.

In this film — ANDRE PREVIN conducts the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra in some of the most popular works from the concert repertoire of Haydn and Mozart. Andre Previn will introduce the programme and discuss the piece to be performed and the lives of Haydn and Mozart, who created these masterpieces, by giving illustrations of aspects of their music with a variety of Orchestral excerpts.

INTERNATIONAL MUSIC DAY: JALATHARANGAM

Throughout the World, the first of October is always celebrated as the International Music Day. Commemorating this event, we present a special programme of an unusual instrument — the JALATHARANGAM — rarely heard these days. Jalatharangam literally means 'Waterwaves'. This consists of a set of 18 porcelain cups of varying sizes. The cups are arranged in a semi-circle before the artist, in decreasing order of size starting with the largest cup to the performer's left and ending with the smallest cup to his right. Water is poured into the cups and the pitch is changed by adjusting the volume of water in the cups. The bigger cups produce a deep bass sound and the smaller cups produce high pitched tones. The cups are arranged in an increasing order of pitch from the left to right. The cups are struck with two thin bamboo sticks. Any music of medium and fast tempo can be played effectively on this melodic instrument.

VIDWAN ANAYAMPATTI S. GANESAN will present a lecture demonstration on the Jalatharangam. Musicologist B. M. SUNDARAM will explain the basic details of this old instrument — which is referred to in ancient literature.

TRIP TO COORG AND KABINI

IWA members will have an opportunity to avail of a package trip planned to Coorg and Kabini in the latter half of December, 1994. The itinerary of 4 days and 3 nights is as under:

DAY 1: Leave for Mysore by Shatabdi Express, a newly introduced luxury train. Reach Mysore by 1330 hrs. A coach will take you to Coorg which is 120 kms. from Mysore. Coorg (1170 mts.) is one of the best hill stations in South India. There you check into Hotel Cauvery. In the evening, you will drive to the Abbey falls which is a pretty, though small waterfall. Try to be at Raja's seat by late evening. Overnight stay in Hotel Cauvery.

DAY 2: Drive to Bhagamandala. The 30 km. road from Madikeri to Bhagamandala is flanked by a variety of trees and bamboo bushes. The shrine is built in the multi-roofed Kerala style and resembles the temples of distant Nepal. Drive further to Thala Cauvery which is the birth place of the river Cauvery, on the slopes of the Brahmagiri hills, about 40 kms. from Madikeri. The region around is associated with the Pandavas, the heroes of the epic, the Mahabharata. Stay overnight at Hotel Cauvery.

DAY 3: Drive to Karapur and check into the colonial — styled lodges over looking the Kabini river. Kabini is situated on the Eastern fringes of the Nagarhole wild life sanctuary on the banks of the river Kabini, a tributary of the holy Cauvery. The lodge is a dream come true for nature lovers. Here nature is left to grow at her own pace. The best times to spot wildlife are late evenings and early mornings. Spend the night at Kabini River Lodge.

DAY 4: Drive to Mysore (80 kms.) to catch the Shatabdi Express at 1400 hrs. Arrival at Madras at 2130 hrs.

QUOTE: The package cost is Rs. 4350 per head.

The quote includes accommodation on a twin sharing basis, transportation by non-A.C. 12 seater coach, and rail tickets. Accommodation at Kabini River Lodge is inclusive of meals.

NOTE: While every effort will be made to make the travel and stay comfortable, the very nature of the locations involved might prove a little strenuous for those who have difficulty with climbing, walking on uneven terrain, etc. Members should keep this in mind while responding to this trip.
