AMONG FRIENDS - FOND MEMORIES OF NIRMAL

It began quite unassumingly 10 years ago April, after I had been living in Madran, India, for nearly a year. An Indian woman whom I had never even met asked to meet with me. I invited her for tea to River House, my very grand, quite imposing residence. As wife of the US Consul General for South India, the house came with my husband's title. Not that Nirmal Seshadri was Intimidated by all the trapping Certainly not I She had a mission and she intended to see it fulfilled.

Nirmal wanted to establish a cross-cultural organization in that bustling city of five million, but she couldn't do it alone. To be truly inter-cultural, she needed a prestigious non-Indian to act as a co-leader and thus encourage and validate non-Indian membership. That's where I came in, though at the time I thought I would be doing little more than lending my name to an organization I thought worthy rather like being an honorary chairman. My newly acquired friend thought otherwise. My final two years in Madras working to filmly establish the International Women's Association, consumed a major part of my time.

As the wife of a diplomat, I'd lived overseas most of my adult life. I consider myself broad minded, well aware of other cultures. Still, I was unprepared for Nirmal's announcement that the start up meeting for the IWA would begin at 10-15 am I protested.

"Start the event at 10-00 or 10-30", I said, "nothing ever starts at 10-15".

But Nirmal was adamant. Since I still barely knew her, I felt in no position to argue. "OK", I thought, "I'll humour her. This is her project, after all",

Approximately 30 women of various nationalities became IWA members that first day. As the co-founders, Nirmal and I were chosen co-presidents. Our 'baby" grew stronger each month. Because of our constant association, our relationship also grew, from being merely acquaintances to becoming close friends to ultimately operating as soul mates. By Christmas the mystery of the starting time had been solved.

"Every good Hindu knows that in order for a new venture to be successful, it has to begin at the auspicious moment, precisely", explained Nirmal in her clipped, perfect English. "My astrologer told me when the first IWA meeting should begin.

I didn't know you well enough in July to explain. I didn't want you to laugh at me". By then, our relationship was close, an easy give and take. I could chuckle about the seriousness.

Meanwhile, the membership expanded rapidly. In that first year nearly 100 IWA programmes were presented. Ten activity groups meet each month, in the arts, in philosophy, to travel both in and out of India, to cook. Each activity, plus the Executive Committee is chaired by two women, an Indian and a non-Indian. When two dozen Indians are working closely with non-Indians planning monthly programmes, strong friendships naturally evolve. Both the officers and the general membership enjoy the opportunity to meet their counterparts from India and other countries in a nurturing environment. The International Women's Association generates cross-cultural understanding at its best.

I left Madras in 1988, with greater sadness than I had ever felt when ending an overseas assignment. Nirmal and I never lost contact. Our friendship was too deep to be terminated by distance. There were letters posted and packages exchanged. As Nirmal's arthritis worsened, her requests for Extra Strength Ben Gay became more frequent. Each month, when my copy of the latest IWA Newsletter would arrive, I would devour its contents. I couldn't attend any of the programmes, but I always knew what IWA was up to.

In July I returned to Madras for the International Women's Association 10th Anniversary celebration. I had known for a couple of years that somehow I would scrape together the airfare, but I had no idea how meaningful the trip would be. It was like watching a tiny baby that has blossomed into a thriving adolescent. For three days the IWA sponsored outstanding cultural events. Nirmal had not been an officer for some time, but she was the guiding force behind the celebration. Her health had deteriorated in the intervening years, but her organisational skill had not. Our time apart made no difference. We fell back into our bantering ways immediately. "Be here, stand here", Nirmal would tell me as she orchestrated the events. My "Yes, Mother" response would always draw a smile.

The tables would turn when I would lecture her like a daughter about her obviously failing health. "You must see the doctor about the arthritis" I said. "Walking has become very difficult for you. The membership is already talking about another celebration in five years. You've got to be there then, too. We're in this together.

She would laugh and say that when the furore over the IWA celebration subsided she would see the doctor.

The last of the events was on a Saturday, a garden party at the showplace home of a leading Indian industrialist whose wife was a former IWA president. The entertainment was a magnificent display of Bharatanatyam, the dancing of South India that is so different from the classical ballet and modern dance of the West. The solo dancer, Malavika Sarukkai, has an international reputation. In fact, she was leaving to tour in the US two days later.

After eight days, with a heavy heart, I left Madras myself. With tears welling up, I promised Nirmal, "I'll be back. You can start planning the 15th anniversary celebration".

On a Sunday afternoon just three weeks later, I was immersed in Indian culture once again, watching Malavika perform in Huston. Just as before, the audience was large and enthusiastic, but it wasn't the same there at Rice University as it had been under giant trees shading the stage in an Indian friend's back yard. I told Malavika that when I spoke to her afterwards.

Two days later I cut the laudatory review of her performance out of the front page of the entertainment section of the Chronicle. I planned to send it along with a copy of the programme to Nirmal. I knew she would appreciate the fact that I had an opportunity to see Malavika dance again so soon. Moments later a fax arrived. It read, "So sorry to be the bearer of very sad news. Nirmal passed away lunchtime today. Had massive brain haemorrhage Sunday morning and was in a coma with only life systems. But to the end, she was up and running".

Of course, I was devastated. But now that the tears have been replaced by a dull ache, there is also a trace of a smile on my lips. I could never forget Madras and the IWA and how they have affected by life, but Nirmal wanted to be absolutely certain of that. Though Madras and Huston are literally half a world apart, she managed to tie me to Madras and the International Women's Association on both the day she took ill and the day she died. I could hear her explanation now:

"But Nancy, I had no choice. Those were the auspicious moments".
