





Gay Rights in India

Homosexuality is generally considered a taboo subject by both Indian society and the Government. In recent years, attitudes are changing and there is far more discussion of homosexuality in the Indian news media and by Bollywood.

On 2 July 2009, a landmark Delhi High Court court ruling decriminalised homosexual intercourse between consenting adults. It judged Section 377 of the Indian Penal Code (a piece of legislation introduced 150 years ago during British Rule) to be conflicting with the fundamental rights guaranteed by the Constitution of India. What does the judgement mean for gay rights in India?

Bryan Dalton is the Consul and Officer for Consular Services at the U.S. Consulate. Dr. Ramakrishnan heads a non-profit organisation SAATHII that strengthens and expands HIV/AIDS services in India. A public health Professional and human rights activist, he has been involved in movements promoting rights and services for LGBT (lesbian/gay/bisexual/transgender) people. Together they will discuss current issues about LGBT equality in the U.S. and India.

Trip to West Bengal & Assam February 7th to February 14th





In February, IWA will visit West Bengal and Assam.

The State of Assam, which is our first destination, is one of the most beautiful regions of India. There is hardly any other state, which has greater variety and colour in its natural scenery and in the cultural treasures of the people that inhabit it. Some call it a magic land while others call it a green paradise.

We fly via Kolkatta to Jorhat and then proceed to the Kaziranga National Park, a World Heritage Site famous for the Great Indian one-horned rhinoceros. Kaziranga, which was declared a National Park in 1974, is inhabited by the world's largest population of onehorned rhinoceroses, as well as many mammals, including tigers, elephants, panthers and bears, and thousands of birds. We take morning and evening safaris into the jungle to catch glimpses of the rhino.

From Kaziranga we proceed to Majuli, the largest fresh water midriver deltaic island of South Asia and located at the upper reaches of the River Brahmaputra. Majuli Island is famous as a bio-diversity hot spot and enriched with rare species of flora and fauna, with fresh water dolphins. For the past 500 years, Majuli has been recognised as the cultural capital of Assam and as the cradle of Assamese civilisation. It is the centre of Assamese Vaishnavite culture and is a repository of rich heritage. It is the nerve centre of neo-Vaishnavite religion, art and culture, having 22 Vaishnava monasteries or satras, which resemble Buddhist monasteries where a number of inmates, called bhaktas, dedicate themselves to religious activities

Guwahati is our next stop where we will visit the famous Khamakya temple, the Srimantha Shankardev Kalakshetra, a multi-arts complex, the State Museum, and Hajo (Hayagreva temple). Saulkuchi (weaver's village) is near Hajo, and literally every home in this village weaves one of three varieties of silk. This would also be a good place for shopping as the customers can buy directly from the artisans. We visit Ashvagandha, where Lord Krishna rested

along with his horses before crossing over the Brahmaputra to vanquish Narakasura.

After half a day's shopping in Kolkata, we proceed to Sunderbans National Park in West Bengal, the largest and probably the most mysterious National Park in India. It was declared a World Heritage Site in 1997. Situated on the largest delta in the world, the Sunderbans (beautiful forest) has the biggest mangrove forest in the world and is home to the largest concentration of Royal Bengal Tigers. Explore the rich wildlife of Sunderbans by taking a boat safari into the wildest depths of nature, inside creeks and dense 🌑 forests. Visit the Sudhanyakhali Watch Tower and cruise through rivers and the narrow creeks of Pitchkhali - Sarakhkhali - 🐙 Sudhanokhali- Bonobibi Dharani (narrow creek). Visit the neighbouring villages to interact with the local community at a typical Sunderban settlement to understand their local art, culture and how man and tiger coexist in such a difficult terrain. The trip will include a visit to a tea estate and evenings of folk dances and entertainment in both Assam and in the Sunderbans.

The cost of the trip is Rs. 39,500/- for Indians and Rs. 44,500/- for Non-Indians.

A JOURNEY TO THE LAND OF THE TSARS - RUSSIA

- Chennal airport was awash with travellers at one a.m. on 5th

 September; but our large group got through ticketing, screening, immigration, customs etc. in record time, and THEN......waited HOURS to take off. Delays occur in the best of circles, so we arrived in Moscow at 1 a.m. on the 6th! Barring that glitch however, nothing marred a delightful trip.
- A morning visit to an ancient monastery now restored— revealed the richness and beauty of walls and ceilings. The Belfry Tower was in three levels, with size of bells to match. The gardens were a riot of colours, filled with flowers and sunshine but I shuddered to think of them in winter!
- An entertaining evening at the Russian Circus followed, with excellent jugglery, acrobatics, clowning and balance feats. The equestrian act was superb. We went on to catch an overnight train to St. Petersberg with tiny coupes with draped and fringed curtains, fairly comfortable, and hot pancakes and caviar for breakfast, served by red-cheeked, but unsmiling girls.
- The grandeur of St. Petersburg was breath taking the river flows through the town under ornamental bridges, with boats large and small, dotted around; imposing houses, palaces, churches and museums on every side and even a glimpse of a mosque, but no hustle and bustle anywhere. (How unlike home!) We lined up at the Hermitage to see a mind-boggling number of artefacts, paintings, chandeliers, furniture, jewellery, armour, curios, and what not. One room housed a large glass cage, with a metal peacock, at least three times larger than life, which is said to spread its tail and whirr at noon. Such art is meant to be taken in small doses over weeks, but we had to rush through at breakneck speed.
 - It was a rewarding visit to the Winter Palace and gardens; the rooms choc- a block with crockery, silver and memorabilia from various countries and ages. A glance into one of the highly decorated bedrooms did raise a niggling doubt as to how Peter the Great fitted into the puffy bedstead, or enjoyed a romp in it.

We saw so many churches, each more beautiful than the last. The frescoes, mosaics, etc in each were unbelievably rich and fresh. We were privileged to hear sacred music in 2 or 3 of them, soft and sublime.


The visit to the Red Square and the Kremlin was unforgettable. The grandeur of the latter and the size of the former, with onion domes springing up in the most unlikely places were stunning. No torture chambers or underground dungeons were shown, so our spy and crime story fears retreated. We watched the changing of the Guard in the huge courtyard. The goose-stepping and the formality were fine, but I must say our change of Guard at the Wagah Border is far ahead in style and grapdeur!

Packed into all this, was a night of Folk Dance, an evening at the Russian Circus and an unforgettable ballet –Tchaikovsky's Swan Lake A real wonderful ending to it all...
