
Those who would like to stay on for a picnic breakfast after the nature trail are welcome to bring along snacks' which can eaten outside the Snake Park.



Curtain raiser for the Mahabalipuram dance festival Ushering in the "Visit India 1991" project, ABHAI (Association of Bharathanatyam artistes of India) are resenting the first Mahabalipuram Dance Festival to be held as a major attraction of the above project. The three day festival will take place on February 195th, 16th & 17th 1991. Different styles



of classical dance are slated for the festival both in the solo and ance drama traditions. IWA member LAKSHMI VISWANATHAN who is the festival's artistic director will give us a short talk on the estival, with an introduction to the programmes planned and an exposition about Abhai. It is to be noted that for the first time, the direction of the festival is being guided by artistes of international repute and it is planned to create an atmosphere of creativity in a venue which is the most moving example of our rich pultural heritage.

Mahabalipuram - the abode of the first of Pallava art - is part of the World Heritage Series. Art Historian Dr. USHA BALAKRISHNAN will give a short talk supported by slides outlining the Pallava Sculpture and its significance.

Programme details of the festival are given elsewhere in the newsletter. This curtain raiser should be a very comprehensive one giving you glimpses of our history, culture and our performing arts.

For the nineteen IWA ladies who boarded the Rameswaram Express on the evening of October 17th, Saturday, the two-day romance with the 'Chettiars' of Chettinad was only about to begin.

We arrived next morning at the Chettinad Station with friendly welcome from hostess Mrs. Seetha Muthiah (I fail to find words to describe her goodness to us). And we beheld our first wonder - there, directly leading from a paved station platform was the driveway to the gleaming mansion of a guesthouse specially built for the Raja of Chettinad, a privilege for his donating the station land! A short drive took us 'Home' for the next two days - in the three gracious family homes alonside the ancestral family home where we were to experience the ultimate in hospitality and throughly enjoy the richly varied Chettinad cuisine. We never tired marvelling at the sheer beauty of the place as we would step into the magnificent carved doorway that led to open courtyards and spacious halls of unparalleled beauty as our feet felt the cool of the famous marbled and mosaic Chettinad tiles. Or, to look up at the high vaulted artistically decorated ceilings with lacework paintings and carvings, and on to the inner courtyard with its columns of gleamings black granite pillars again surrounded by richly carved panelled doors to locked rooms Seetha would soon be opening to give us and insight into life-styles and values of yesteryear and still maintained to this day. The neat endless rows of family photographs

But wait. Day one was billeted for visits to temples around. We started with a visit to the Ganesha temple built of granite pillars at Pillyarpatti. We were fortunate to participate in the Sunday morning 'Abhishekam' followed by a close 'darshan' of the deity in all its splendour of gold covering and to complete the vibrant temple atmosphere, nearby a group of enthusiastic young 'dhoti' clad aspirants recited the vedas with their aged guru. We moved on to the Vairavan temple where we saw more beautiful carvings. At the age-old Avvadayar temple, massive stone blocks had been sized into excellent cornices simulating wood reaper work.

The visit to Chettinad Palace and its environs left us spellbound as also our encounter of yet more magnificent homes - all shown to us by Seetha Muthiah who never tired of us fascinated members' endless queries! The house of Nagappa Chettiar bult in 1932 stands out for its sheer beauty of execution. Stepping into Seetha's childhood home we saw the famous wooden carved ceiling whose grandeur defies description and earlier saw the famous 'Trousseau Rooms' stacked yet as in Allaudin's caves.

To complete the trip for us ladies, there was time for a visit to the local mosaic tile factory at Attungudi and bargain shopping at the antique dealer at Karaikudi which gave us just time to relax, dine and drink in the last of our fantastic holiday as we bid an affectionate farewell to Seetha.

Kudos to the Activity Chairperson, Sujaya Menon who piloted the members of IWA into a 'common happy family' by which we have come to set much store.

OF THE DANCE FESTIVAL

Known also as Mamallepuram, the ancient seashore town owes its existence to the Pallavas of Kanchipuram who ruled from the 3rd to the 8th centuries. The rock cut caves, the monolithic temples, open air bas-reliefs and structural temples in this ancient venue are living testaments to the skills of the ancient Tamil people. The finest examples of Pallava stone sculpture are seen here bringing to life mythology and religious fervour. Referred to by Vaishnavite saints in their hymns, this ancient site which is part of the World Heritage series has invited and inspired the contemporary artists to translate the beauty of its sculpture into choreographed movement. In a specially erected stage, with the monuments forming a natural backdrop, the dance-evenings will be held in the open air. Seating for 1500 visitors is being provided. Special transport services will also be available from Madras City.

To taste the spirit of a new cultural renaissance in the picturesque landscape of an ancient seashore town, to make your hearts dance along with renowned artistes who are choreographing special works for the occasion to re-live a living historical tradition and to relax in the cool southern breeze...
