# THE ART OF PATCHWORK QUILTING

# Demonstration by SUZY KURIEN

The technique of quilting originated in prehistoric times. In the United States Patchwork quilting began during colonial days in the mid nineteenth century when immigrants began practicing the quilting skills they learned in Europe. Quilters frequently made quilts together at Social gatherings called BEES.

Today quilting styles have been revived by needlework artistes who often gather to exchange ideas and practice their craft. Quilters still use traditional patterns and techniques, but with a fresh approach that produces unusual designs.

The effect of quilting is accentuated mainly by the colour combinations used.

Some of the types of quilting on display will be Ninepatch, Sunshine & Shadow, Wedding Ring, Irish Chain, Basketquilt.

# IWA TOUR TO SEE SNAKE BOAT RACES OF KERALA

Alleppey, called the Venice of the East, is the centre for backwater cruises and is also known for its spectacular snake boat races. Each boat manned by over 100 parsmen, literally flies through the waters.

IWA is planning a trip to Kerala so that we may witness the famous Nehru, Boat Race on August 8th.

The tentative programme is as follows:

August 5th — Night — Tour group meets at Central Station
Depart by train for Cochin.

August 6th & 7th - At Cochin

(Take sightseeing tours of Cochin by boat and by road visiting Mattancherry Dutch Palace, Gundu Island, Jewish Synagogue, St. Francis Church, Museums. See Chinese fishing nets en route).

Visit Trichur to see Kerala style Vadakkunathan Temple if time permits.

August 8th & 9th - At Alleppey

August 8th - Morning - Visit Ambalapuzha Krishna Temple

- Afternoon - Witness Nehru Boat Race

August 9th — Morning — Cruise through the backwaters which form the lifeline connecting the villages. This is an out-of-the-world experience.

- Afternoon - Board train for Madras

August 10th — Morning — Arrive at Madres

Travel will be by 2nd class A/C train both ways. Accommodation will be in A/C double rooms in 2 to 3 Star hotels.

As the Railways require names of passengers before issuing tickets, please give in your names between May 25th & June 10th to Shakunthala or Seema (Please call between 8 and 10 a.m.) and **full payment** by June 20th latest. We have made arrangements for 26 persons, so it will be on a
