FROM THE VICE-PRESIDENTS

You will see in the later pages of this Newsletter that Current Events are investigating the possibility of increasing the number of women in the Indian Parliament. This is a subject close to our hearts.

In the UK over the last 18 years of Conservative government, despite having a female Prime Minister for a good part of that time, the number of women in Parliament was very low indeed. Mrs. Thatcher was always known as the best 'man' for the job, not the best woman, an attitude that suggests that good women are the exception rather than the rule, and that if a woman is good and successful, then she is a man really, in female clothing! Similarly in India, Indira Gandhi was known as the only 'man' in the Cabinet.

Neither is a woman politician safe from her own sex. A successful woman is often criticised for being too manly, or too uncaring of her family, or too ruthless. It seems it is difficult for both sexes to adjust to thi dea that ability is found equally distributed between the sexes wherever you have had equality of education to base it on.

It was very interesting, therefore, that this summer in the UK saw the ascendancy of the New Labour party to power. This party has seen fit to promote women in Parliament in a big way. The party insisted through positive discrimination, that women should be the elected candidate to stand for the party in some constituencies. From these many new women MPs, five have been selected as Ministers. The new Secretary of State for Northern Ireland, is a woman and it will be fascinating to see if this new breed of MPs will be any more successful than its male counterparts. The general feeling, rightly or wrongly, is that more women MPs will mean more common sense and more decency in Parliament. Women are having their chance at long last in Britain.

Is our time also coming in India? Today there are over a million women in Village Panchayats and there are women MPs in both houses of the Indian Parliament.

Please God that women don't let themselves down when and if they get their chance in Government!



WHITE KIDNEY BEAN DESSERT - for those who did not attend the Vietnamese Cooking morning

INGREDIENTS

White kidney beans

(Thatapairu) - 1 cup Coconut - 1 Glutinous white rice - 1 cup Vanilla essence - 1 tsp Sugar - 2 cups Salt - a pinch

1st Day

Soak the beans in just enough water to cover. Leave it aside for 5 hrs. Cook the beans till soft in the same water. Add water if necessary. (Do not strain water as the flavour will go). Put the cooked beans into a bowl, add sugar, stir well and leave overnight in the refrigerator. Take the beans out of the fridge 2 hrs before they are required.

2nd Day

Grate the coconut, using 1/2 cup of water, extract milk (preferably in the blender). Cook the rice in 3 cups of water. It should be like porridge. Mix together the beans and the rice thoroughly. Put into individual bowls and top the dessert with a spoonful of coconut milk and serve. This dessert has a very mild flavour.






THE SONG OF THE WEAVES
