Fifteen ladies flew to Malaysia suitably chaperoned by a very personable young gentleman from 'Cox & King' and on arrival in Kuala Lumpur a young Malaysian who would introduce us to the land and culture of Peninsula Malaysia met us.

The two History Culture and Tours Chairpersons, Vidya Singh and Pat Alter, who are both seasoned travellers, with true attention to detail, ensured that all members of the Group were cared for and all arrangements ran smoothly. (Thank You from the entire group).

After arrival in KL, we travelled to the States of Malacca Kelantan and Terengganu and back to KL by coach and air. We passed through he States of Selangar and Negeri Semeilan (a matriarchal society) to Malacca and briefly visited Pahang on the East Coast to see a Turtle nesting site at Cherating which is the Back Packers Base in the South China Sea.

The land was green with Palm Oil Trees and ferns used as land cover. The 'Toll Roads' were clean and straight and the scars left by the Tin Mines had been filled in and converted to Hotel Complexes.

We visited shopping malls and gazed at Designer clothing and footwear. We visited the tallest buildings in the world – The Twin towers in KL. In contrast we visited Heritage sites in Malacca where there is evidence of Portuguese and Dutch conquests of the area and where we experienced our one and only trishaw ride. We were taken on a river cruise in Kuala Terrengganu. In Kota Bahru we saw the Sultan and his wife in our Hotel and in Malacca we heard the Chief Minister of that State.

We visited Food Courts and ate 'Kway Teow' and 'Tahu Goreng'.

Our vegetarian ladies could not enjoy these treats, but we all gorged ourselves on Rumbutans, Durran, Papaya, Star fruit, Watermelons, Mangoes and Roast Chestnuts.

The Company was excellent, so what did we miss coming from India? - the crowds, the cows and the dogs!!

We heard that Malaysia in modernizing itself is in danger of losing its crafts. We saw kite making and top spinning by an elderly man. His son confessed that he does not have either skill. We did not see Penang, the Cameroon Heights, Malaysian Borneo and Brunei. All that and more would need another trip, which would be a very good idea.

We arrived backing Chennai past 11 p.m. and would you believe it, Rani was there to receive us!

JEWELS OF THE NIZAMS

The wealth of the Nizams of Hyderabad reposed in land, palaces, cash, gold and a legendary collection of gemstones and jewellery. Their exquisitely crafted ornaments range in date from the 18th to the early 20th centuries. In 1995, the Government of India purchased these jewels. They were recently exhibited in the National Museum, New Delhi. Today's talk, illustrated with slides of the outstanding items in the collection, will trace the history of the jewels and the tangled process of their acquisition.

Our speaker is Dr. Usha R. Bala Krishnan, an art and jewellery historian and Bombay-based fine arts consultant. Her monumental publication, titled 'Dance of the Peacock: Jewellery Traditions of India', has won much acclaim. Invited by the Government of India to study and document the Nizam jewels, she has had the rare and singular privilege of handling and minutely examining every single item in the collection.







WEEKEND TRIP TO HYDERABAD

Join us on a weekend trip to Hyderabad, where we have arranged to view the Nizam's priceless collection, exhibited in the city for the first time ever, at the Salarjung Museum. The exhibition comes to Hyderabad following the recent, well publicised showing at the National Museum in New Delhi.

We depart Chennai by evening train Friday, November 23rd, have Saturday and Sunday in Hyderabad, and arrive back in Chennai early morning Monday, November 26^{rb}. The estimated cost of the trip is Rs. 5,000. this covers return train tickets (2/AC sleeper), one night's hotel (twin share / breakfast), coach transport in Hyderabad and exhibition entry. Those who wish to return by air (one way fare approx. Rs. 3,600) may do so, but are responsible for their own ticket purchase and airport transfers.


