

Autism - Normal appearance, but disturbing behavior

For many years the brain disorder autism occurred in about 5 children per 10,000 live births. However, since the early 1990's, the rate has increased up to 60 per 10,000.

What are the causes and conditions? How can it be treated? And what are the strategies to handle and live with autism?

To help us to understand and promote acceptance of this handicap, Sadiya Saleh will talk about all these issues. There will be a 10-minute video, followed by an opportunity to ask Mrs. Saleh questions about the subject.

Sadiya Saleh has been working with Vidya Sagar (formerly, "The Spastic Society of India, Chennai) for 12 years. She has a Post Graduate Diploma in special education for people with neurological impairment. As Co-ordinator Human Resource Development she is in charge of all types of training for teachers, parents and students at Vidya Sagar. Sadiya Saleh is also member of the Senior Management Group of the Institution.

The Cambodian and Thai Trip



Early morning of February 23rd, 2005 saw a wide awake group of 25 at the Meenambakkam airport guiding their baggage trolleys to check-in.

The first three days of site-seeing were perhaps the most memorable, spent in exploring the ruins and relics of the vanished Khmer civilization at Angkor Thom, Ta Prohm, The Bayon temple, Angkor Wat and other sites. Lesser marvels of architecture were the terraces of The Elephant and Leper-king and The Banteay Kdai, but only in comparison to the glory of the main structures at the Angkor Thom and Angkor Wat's for the latter. Will anyone forget the artistry & magnificence of the neglected friezes and fallen stones of the Angkor temples, and will everyone not remember the beauty of a golden red sun, rising over the still dark temples of Angkor Wat throwing its symmetrical reflection on the twin tily-ponds, and framing the lotus spires with mathematical precision? A group spell-bound and awestruck by an unforgettable experience!

Equally overwhelming were the towering banyans of Ta Prohm rising majestically [100ft & more] from their stone base, their roots overrunning abandoned temples, stradling the loveliest of friezes.

Sunrise and Banyan trees are two abiding memories of our brief excursion to Cambodia. Other images we carry of this country pertain to everyone's favourite diversion viz. shopping. Quite different and distinctive were the widely sold grass bags and embroidered pouches, the puppets and other wooden carvings-all beautiful hand crafted items, and reasonably priced. Disturbing though was the sight of the little children selling their wares in the most soulful manner and begging for money to pay for their education. What was the artifice and what was the reality?

From Cambodia and its tourism showcasing the past, the tour proceeded to Thailand, a kingdom that venerates its king and its monks, and is a flag-bearer of Buddhism. Thailand was a fascinating mixture of temples and modernity: of Buddha's and floating markets. A natural courtesy and dignity does not prevent the Thais from being energetic in the pursuit of modern trades and professions. Indeed, a highlight of the group's tour of Thailand was a variety of shopping besides the Buddha's temples.

But perhaps the most memorable place we visited in Thailand, besides obvious Bangkok and the northern hill station Chiang-Mai, was Chiang-Rai. This is the site of the famed Golden Triangle, the point in Thailand from which one glimpses Burma and Cambodia. Though the border is technically closed, Burmese traders cross a bridge into Chiang-Rai, sell their wares from day-shops, and hastily close down and return to Burma at 6pm daily, the curfew time. The opium museum was also visited, making its startling allegation that this destructive drug was introduced into Asia by the soldiers of Alexander the Great.

Bangkok is notable for its canals, as well as the Bangpa-In palace, or summer palace. It is a sight to behold immaculately-kept,

manicured lawns and topiary gardens, which we toured on selfdriven, motorized cars, and had great fun doing so. The cruise of the Menam Chaophraya by night was memorable. The singing and dancing, while navigating the river by moonlight, was the most enjoyable evening of the trip. It was beautiful to view the lights of Bangkok as we cruised the river.

The famous Buddha temples of Bangkok: The Golden Buddha [which weighs five and a half tons of solid gold], The Emerald Buddha [small in size but beautifully crafted], the reclining Buddha [45mts in length & covered with gold leaf], all of them very well kept, were worth visiting and will remain in our memory for a long time.

The reclining Buddha, in the open, in Ayuthya was soothing in its gentle visage and the imposing stupas bring back images of Sarnath in India. Jim Thompson's museum is a great achievement by an individual, who was not a Thai in origin. His collection of ancient Thai articrafts is housed in two century old Thai houses, carefully dismantled and reconstructed in the heart of Bangkok. The gardens of the houses seem to flow into the interiors-beautiful pink lotuses, ornamental orchids and the rarest of plants.

We cannot end without mentioning the night market, which sold almost everything one could imagine at a discounted price. It was exciting to shop at midnight and make a clever bargain.
